Krohn innocent of misconduct

Dr. Don R. Krohn was found not guilty last week of second-degree criminal sexual conduct against a Krohn, a Farmington Hills resident

High school student awaits June 24 trial

A Harrison High School student is awaiting a June 24 trial date in Oakland County Circuit Court in connection with a June 7 shooting incident at the school.
Kola Nikolas Camaj, 17, stood mute at his June 8 arraignment before 47th District Court Judge Margaret Schaeffer. A plea of innocent was entered for him.
Bond was set at \$3,000 for each of the five counts against the youth. He is charged with two counts of felonious assault, carrying a concealed weapon and two charges of possessing a firearm while committing a felony. He is free on bond.
A 16-year-old student also was held in connection with the incident which, police say, stemmed from an argument during which another student made an obscene gesture to one of the two young men. The younger student

is at Oakland County Juvenile Home. He will receive a juvenile hearing. Last Tuesday's incident began, according to police, when the two students returned to the school in the afternoon to settle an argument.
AN OLDER student pulled out a gun when his companion was held by other youths on a Harrison High sidewalk. During an ensuing fight, which spilled out into the parking lot, four shots were fired, police say.
The pair allegedly fled but were arrested a short time later on a nearby street.

and chief of obstetrics and gynecology at Providence Hospital in Southfield, had claimed amnesia after drinking with business partners the evening of the reported incident last October.
The victim, whose name is withheld, charged that he entered her home without knocking about 4 a.m. while she was on the phone. She said he grabbed the phone, wrestled her into the library and made sexual overtures before she was rescued after her screams were heard over the phone.
There was no courtroom denial of charges by police that Krohn was intoxicated or that he had tried to enter one other home in West Bloomfield before entering that of the complainant.
A spokesperson in the prosecutor's office said the basis of the judge's decision was that there was reasonable doubt of Krohn's intent because of intoxication.
"Personally, I'm very unhappy. I feel badly for the victim," said Asst. Prosecutor Michael Schloff.
The victim's husband found the verdict "inconceivable, a travesty of justice."

The woman who brought the charges was obviously shaken by the decision.
"I would have given anything that this had never happened to me," said the mother of four. "I don't think I'll ever get over it."
KROHN STILL faces charges of drunken driving and failure to stop for a police officer.
Police reported that when they were summoned to the complainant's home last October they chased the man in his car for several blocks as he drove over lawns and sped around corners.
The prosecutor's office confirmed the case had been suppressed at the request of the doctor's attorneys.
"It is the right of either the defense or the prosecutor in such cases," Schloff said.
Krohn's defense claimed he suffered amnesia brought on by hypoglycemia and that he had no memory of the events after leaving a Farmington bar until he was in the local police car.
A breathalyzer test administered at the time by police indicated intoxication.

Board turns down state aid Schools reduce debt levy

The Farmington school board turned down \$30,000 in state aid for the debt levy but reduced the debt levy millage from 4.37 mills to 3.8 mills at last week's meeting.
The 1/2-mill reduction means a 50 cents drop in school taxes on every \$1,000 of assessed value for Farmington School District residents, despite the outcome of today's election.
To take advantage of the \$30,000 from the state, the board was required to reduce the debt levy by one

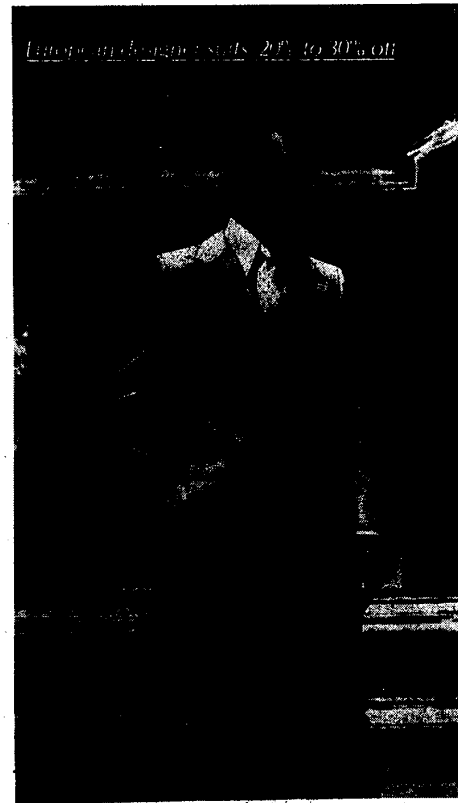
mill, which Business Mgr. William Prisk believes would jeopardize payments next year, said Business Mgr. William Prisk.
"The district could live this year with a 3.3 levy, but I cannot guarantee that it would not be necessary to increase the levy next year to compensate for that lowering," he told the board.
"I could guarantee that we if we lower the levy to 3.8, we would not have to increase it next year and perhaps we could lower it next year," Prisk added.

the decision, with Trustee Michael Shipiece casting the dissenting vote. Shipiece argued for the one-mill reduction, claiming the fund equity is too large.
The debt levy millage, distinct from operating millage, pays for bonds and interest sold by the district. Fund equity from debt levy taxes cannot be used for operating.
The debt levy, nine mills in 1967, has been decreased to the current 3.8 mills, said Trustee Dr. Mervyn Ross. Only once in 10 years has the board been forced to increase the debt levy, he said.
