

Vets issue heartworm warning

With the warm weather here and the height of the mosquito season approaching, the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) is warning dog owners across the country to protect their pets against canine heartworm disease.

The disease is caused by long, white worms whose infective larvae are spread from dog to dog by mosquitoes. Previously the disease was confined to the Eastern seaboard and Gulf regions. However, the American Heartworm Association reported that today the disease is found in every state east of the Rocky Mountains. The disease can be detected through a blood test and is curable. The AVMA reminded that prevention is the best medicine. It advised that in areas where the disease is a problem dogs be examined regularly and be started on a preventative program. Here's how area House members were recorded on major roll call votes May 26 through June 1.

Clean Air Act: Adopted, 25 for and 139 against, an amendment softening federal auto-emission standards. It was attached to the 1977 Clean Air Act Amendments (HR 6161), later passed and sent to the Senate.

Area lawmakers voting in favor of the amendment were Republicans William Broomfield of Bloomfield and Carl Pursell, and Democrats David Bonior of Mt. Clemens, William Brodhead of Detroit and James Blanchard of Pleasant Ridge.

The amendment was supported by the auto manufacturers and the United Auto Workers union and opposed by environmentalists. It gives auto makers a two-year delay (until the 1980 model year) before they must meet hydrocarbon emission standards, temporarily waives the proposed nitrogen oxide standard, and permanently softens the carbon monoxide standard. Those are the three major auto pollutants regulated by the 1970 Clean Air Act.

Rep. James Broyhill (R-N.C.), a sponsor of the amendment, said its purpose "is to achieve strict air quality controls and, at the same time, balance this concern with other national goals." He added: "Our amendment will not only control automobile pollution, it will also save fuel, hold down consumer costs and preserve the strength of the American economy."

Rep. Henry Waxman (D-Calif.), an opponent, said: "The auto industry has spent an incredible amount of money in this lobbying campaign, and I think if they had spent that money in trying to meet these standards we would not be fighting this fight today, and we would be talking about cleaner cities and healthier people across the country."

Porpoises: Adopted, 244 for and 109 against, an amendment lowering the quota of porpoises that can be killed by commercial tuna fishermen in 1977. The overall bill (HR 6970) had recommended a quota of 78,000, but this amendment lowered the number to 68,000. HR 6970 was later passed.

The Senate has not yet acted. Bonior, Brodhead, Blanchard and Broomfield supported the amendment. Pursell did not vote. The bill's main thrust is to resolve the dispute between environmentalists

and the merchant marine industry over the porpoise killing that is an incidental by-product of yellowfin tuna fishing. The porpoises, a diminishing species, are unavoidably netted along with the tuna since the tuna industry ended hook fishing and switched to gill nets to increase catches and cut labor costs. HR 6970 seeks to minimize the incidental killing while protecting the economic interests of the tuna industry.

Rep. Tim Lee Carter (R-Ky.), a supporter of the amendment, said: "To me needless killing of the porpoises is almost like killing humans. I think we should avoid with all the strength we have the unnecessary killing of these mammals."

Rep. Bob Wilson (R-Calif.), an opponent of the lower quota, said: "I don't think that the amendment will accomplish anything... except to fuz up the bill, to make it unworkable, and to drive the tuna fishermen to some other area where they can fish, or else just drive them into bankruptcy."
