Colonial Americans had a hard time obtaining patterned cloth. When it was imported from England, it was sery expensive and available only near coastal ports.

The thrifty and those far from the Atlantic were normally clothed in plain, sturdy, home woven textiles. For those special occasions when something more was indicated, embroidery and weaving provided the designs—but at the cost of much labor. Perhaps pattern was so cherished because it was difficult to obtain. Those who could decorated not only their persons, but their living quarters as well.

one full set of American bed furnishings exists today in its entirety. The curtains would go to one daughter, the back cloth to another, and so on. Bed covers fit into this decorative producer. Their patterns could be empeuter. A tradition of woven woolen coverlets was already hundreds of years old in Europe when the first colonists set foot in America. As soon as they could, they shared sheep, built looms and began wearing coverlets here. Early looms were large, box-like affairs and home made. At first they were set up in the one room where all living took place, But as soon as circumstances gave her the chance, the housewife got the loom out of her living room. WEAVERS WERE usually men whenever "odd spells and rainy seasons" freed them from their chores. It took muscle to operate those primi-

It took muscle to uperate mose point-tive looms.

Women didn't escape work though.
They carded fleece, washed and dyed wool, and spun yarn. It took eight full-time spinners to keep up with one full-time waver. Because the lady of the house was preoccupied with cook-

ing, sewing, and child raising, it us ally fell to the younger or older females in the house to do the spinning. They were therefore called "spinsters".

Many pounds of yarn were needed to warp the loom. A woman might walk up to 20 miles a day while spinning wool on a large spinning wheel. Not surprisingly, these were called "walking wheels".

Early coverlets woven of such home-produced yarns on a home-made loom were called "overshot." They were geometric, usually indigo blue and white, and always had a seam up the middle.

Overshot coverlets were cherished, not only for their color and pattern, but for the hours of hard work they represented. They were well made and some have lasted until today. Check your attic—you may own a treasure.
