# Bentley grid coach dies

Bentley High School of Livonia and Suburban Eight athletic league teams were shocked by the sudden death of Glen Goode, the Bulldogs' varsity football coach for eight years before resigning several months ago.

Goode, who was 38 and a Farmington Hills resident, died of a heart attack while jogging near his home Thursday.

Besides his football tenure, Goode was an assistant coach in baseball, basketball and track at Bentley in addition to teaching physical education and health. He had been a coach and athletic director at three Catholic high schools in the Detroit area before coming to Livonia in 1969.

Goode said when he resigned this spring that his football teams haven't

been winning "and I thought the thing to do was to step aside and give someone else a chance."

He added at the time that he may be interested in returning as an assistant coach if the school's coach needed him.

Bentley had only two winning seasons under Goode and the Bulldogs finished sixth in the league with a 2-5 record and an overall mark of 3-6.

Plymouth Salem and Redford Union are in the Sub-8 league.

**FUNERAL SERVICES** for Goode, of 23144 Bayberry, Farmington Hills, were scheduled to be held this morning at McCabe Funeral Home and St. Fabian Catholic Church, both in Farmington Hills.

He is survived by his wife, Marion; daughter, Gayle; and four brothers, Gerald, Richard, Donald and James.

Officiating at the service was Msgr. Charles J. Malloy.

Goode was born Oct. 8, 1938 and received his BS in education from the University of Detroit in 1963 and his MA in education from Wayne State University five years later.

He taught three years at St. Mary High in Royal Oak and coached the football, basketball and baseball teams.

In 1966, he went to St. Francis Cabrini High School in Allen Park and won the 1967 Catholic football league city championship and helped develop a weight training and agility program. He was also assistant basketball and track coach.

He moved to Benedictine High in 1968 to become athletic director and formulate intra-mural and varsity athletic programs, including football, basketball, track, hockey, swimming, golf and skiing.

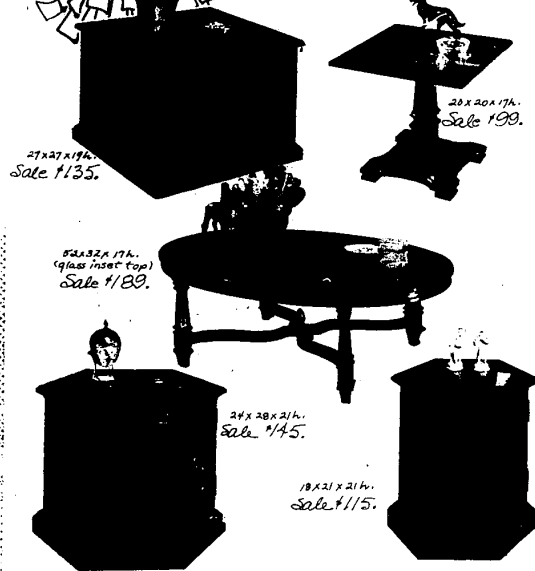
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
