Greg's Disneyland dream came true

Greg Walsh spent much of his young life dreaming of a trip to Dis-ney World. When it seemed least likely to happen, his dream came true.

5. They came home on July 8. Greg
died the next day after a seven-year
battle against cancer which had hospitalized him more than once.

His dream trip became more than a dream when Jo Gillard of Bloomfield Hills learned of his illness. Greg's e mother is a student in Mrs. Gillard's office worker training class at the Bir-mingham Center for Continuing Edu-cation.

When Greg was hospitalized in May, Mrs. Walsh explained to Mrs. Gillard. why she would be absent from class.

"The prognosis was that Greg had three to six months to live because of two massive brain tumors." Mrs. Walsh said Tuesday.

"MRS. GILLARD asked me if there was anything Greg wanted that she could help with. I said. 'Yes, but there is nothing you can do about it.'

"Mrs. Walsh continued. referring to the cost of the trip.

"We'll work on it if he gets to the point where he could handle the trip."

"I assumed that was as far as it would go." Mrs. Walsh recalled. But as Greg railied again. Mrs. Gillard asked his mother to check with the doctor about the possibility of making the trip.

ed car in Florida and the Royal Plaza Hotel at Disney World made sure Mrs. Walsh and Greg had first-floor

"It just seemed like everything fell into place." Mrs. Gillard said. "Some people said it couldn't be done because we didn't have enough time. "I told them there wasn't any time, that we had to do it now and everyone was with us 100 per cent of the way." Mrs. Walsh waited until a short time before she and Greg were to leave before telling him about the trip. He recalled having read about children who were dving being taken to Disney World and asked his mother. "Am I going to die?" "Yes. but so am It." she told him. "He said he would rather go to Disney World and come home and die than not to go." Greg was a student at Covington Junior High. Until his illness prevented it. he had a paper route, enjoyed baseball and was working toward his Eagle Scout rank. Scouts from Troop 1007 formed annone guard at his funeral. Dr. Carol Turner, coordinator of carer/vocational education for the Birmingham Schools, praised Mrs. Gillard for her efforts in making the trip possible.
