

Room for Design Furnishings market reflects trend toward individualism

One thing that seems quite clear, judging from the new design collections making their bow at Summer 1977 Home Furnishings Markets, is that "mix is the message" in all areas of the decorating scene.

Traditional styling is strong, but so is contemporary, and nostalgia and the natural look are running neck and neck.

What we are seeing is the greatest diversity of styles offered in recent

years. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to single out any one trend as today's or tomorrow's leader. The reason is that manufacturers are realizing that American consumers are a diverse group with independent and varying tastes that can't be satisfied with any one fashion trend or motif.

Isn't that true today in the clothing fashion industry as well? We are happily doing our own thing instead of

showing up as look-alikes. So it is in our homes today.

THE MANUFACTURER is identifying separate clusters of tastes in decor and producing a wide range of designs to satisfy as many consumers as possible. This assessment also applies to decorative accessories and accent pieces.

There is a potpourri of design themes ranging from elaborately sculptured mural-pieces of Roman Ruins to contemporary prints in trim lattice frames.

Many are reproduced from deep-dimensional originals executed in wood by highly trained sculptors. In translating intricate designs from drawings on paper to relief carvings in wood, the sculptors achieve a remarkable illusion of depth.

Wicker is winning as the newest addition to the living areas of the home, not only the sun-porches. It has settled in for what promises to be a long run in avant-garde circles, available in any type piece imaginable—to sit on, to look at, to put things on, to eat from and/or to accessorize with. Bloomington honors two

They were honored last April at the University's traditional Founder's Day program on the Bloomington campus, which recognizes both academic achievement of the undergraduate students and teaching excellence of the faculty.

To make the dean's list, students must earn a 3.5 grade point average (4.0 is perfect) or better (3.3 for University Division students) in a minimum of 12 hours of course work.

ONE OF MRS. NIXON'S special interests is English watercolors and she will be bringing some of them to Plymouth. Avidly collected by Europeans for years, they are still relatively unknown outside of major auction houses and leading galleries.

To create an atmosphere of olden times at the mart, women of the Symphony League will circulate among the booths dressed in costumes reminiscent of the Shaker period.
