Richardson quits council race

In an election year which was predicted by many to be dull, the second surprise of the season has come with the announcement by City of Farmington Mayor John Richardson that he will withdraw as a candidate for reclection to the council. Richardson, who has served on the council for eight years, announced his intentions in a letter addressed to the city council and City Mgr. Robert Deadman dated August 17. Richardson had filed by the August 12 dead-line to run.

In a similar action earlier this year, Farmington Hills Mayor Joan Dudley Hild for relection and than announced she would withdraw. Richardsons withdrawal from contention leaves five candidates vving for three seast. Toose remaining in the race are incumbents Alton Benett, seeking a second term. and Richard Tupper. Newcomers in contention are Allen Silver man. Johnne McShane and Warren Buckler. The top two vole-exters will receive four-year terms. while the candidate re-

civing the third highest number of votes will be elected to a two year term.

IN HIS LETTER Richardson labeled increasing derands on his time caused by his recent election as president of the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association coupled with his desire to spend more time with his family.

"After much soul searching, it is with regret but with considerable relief, that I have decided not seek another term as a Farmington City coun-

cilman." said Richardson.
"My decision not to seek reelection
at this time should in no way be construed to mean that I am no longer
available for service to my community."

Public opinion sought on parks expansion plan

Farmington Hills residents will have a chance to speak out on development of a parks and recreation system in their community at unight's council session beginning at 7 p.m. in council chambers. Eleven Mile and Orchard Lake roads.

The proposed master plan study was made by Bills and Childs Associates, a planning consultant firm.

The firm was hired earlier this year to study the city's recreational needs after political debate divided the community on what kind of parks to develop—small neighborhood parks or a large regional facility.


