In addition to those from private col-lections, pieces are coming in from the Cleveland Museum of Art which has a fine Oriental collection, Mich-igan State University, University of Michigan and the Buffalo Science Mu-seum.

THE HIGHLIGHT of the exhibit will be a lecture by Ms. Joan Hartman, at 8 p.m., Sept. 10, followed by a champagne reception. The cost for this program is \$5.

Dr. Siegel is hopeful that Michigan Council for the Arts will look favor-ably upon a grant request to help cover costs for the program and dis-play. So far he hasn't received word on his application.

In each of the three previous displays, the society has stressed a particular area of Oriental art which also is typical of the diversified interests of society members within the total Oriental art spectrum.

One former exhibit focused on Chinese ceramics and another on decorative arts from 1736 to 1936.

Dr. Siegal's particular interest is Japanese wood engravings, ukiyo-e prints, especially those from the Ch'ing and Ming periods.

He recalled he first saw several at the home of a fellow psychiatrist, liked them immediately, saw more at the Liggett antique show and later went to London and bought five of them.

It was while Siegel and his wife, a jade collector, were in the Birming-ham Gallery talking to John

of ukiyo-e prints, that the idea for an Oriental art society was first mentioned.

Siegel recalled that one of them re-marked how nice it would be to have a study group that would meet regu-larly. McKinney later called a dozen persons with similar interests and the group was on its way:

The nine meetings each year in-clude lectures by authorities in vari-ous fields of Oriental art, and visits to museums here and in other cities. Members range from private collec-tors to dealers and teachers in the field and many who just like Oriental art.

The coming exhibit which will be in

two cases in the Cranbrook Institute of Science, Siegel said, will be one of the best.

He pointed out that while jade has long been associated with China, very little of it comes from China itself.

Jade, usually carved, is rated as, having a six to 6½ level of hardness as compared to a diamond which has a hardness rating of 10.

Siegel said there is no ignoring the fact that there is presently a decided rise in interest in Oriental art.

"Contemporary Chinese art is available, but the good things are getting scarce."

In addition to a variety of ewers and decorative pieces, the show at the Cranbrook Institute will include burial terms such as a Pi-disk (propuenced bee) which was put under the body, a variety of carved blades, containers for brushes and other writing supplies, carved animals, dishes, snuff bottles and jewelry.
