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


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Rotary fowl feast had humble beginnings

first Rotary Club chicken barbecue 21 years ago probably never dreamed the day would come when 15,000 dinners would be served in the short span of seven hours to become the most concentrated one-day feast in

But that is exactly what happened.

"We didn't have a very auspicious start," said Don Sutherland, who, with Don Lightfoot and Buck Champe, started the event.

"We arranged to barbeque 500 chicken halves that day down on the playgrounds at Joy Road and Fairgrounds, but we didn't sell more than half of them," he recalled. "In fact, we divided up the leftovers and took them home.

The original barbeque was sponsored by the Plymouth Rotary Club to raise funds for the purchase of playground equipment. And from that standpoint, the first effort was a success.

"We did purchase swings and slides," Sutherland recalled, "and built a mound for the youngsters to use for bobsledding in the winter. I think the mound is still there."

The rather disappointing start didn't bother Sutherland and his

two compatriots. So the event was continued the next year with more success-and finally moved to Kellogg Park in the heart of the downtown business section to become a tradition on the Sunday following Labor Day each year.

For several years, Rotary went at it alone. Then the Fall Festival was born and the chicken barbecue became its crowning offer-

The real success came with the move to the park, and today it attracts diners from all sections of the state. It has taken on the aura of being the leader of such affairs in the entire country.

Through the years, it has drawn very few frowns from Lady Luck, and her pal, the Rainmaker. Only once or twice in the 21 years has the rain fell, and even then, the show went on.

Karen Schrader heads the effort which includes rughooking, basket weaving and horse shoeing.



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
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
