It's fill 'er up at the pancake smorgasbord

One thing nice about "all you can eat" dinners is that no one complains about the size of the servings except those who overeat and stumble into the street hunting for antacid relief.

That's one reason why "Pancake Day" is the success it is every year at the Plymouth Fall Festival—few persons walk away discouraged with the serving.

For \$2, you can sit inside the Masonic Temple on Penniman Avenue and Union Street all day and eat all the pancakes your stomach desires, in addition to a serving of sausage and milk or coffee.

sausage and milk or coffee. "Pancake Day" will start bright and early at 7 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 10 and run until 7 p.m. That's 12 hours of sheer delight or misery if you hang around the Temple for too long. Pancake organizer Don Tripp of

Pancake organizer Don Tripp of the Plymouth Kiwanis Club says the trick to serving so many flapjacks is having enough experienced hands and many hot grills.

The Kiwanians have the art of pancake cooking down to a science. The size is always the same and so is the color of the pancakes—a light, golden brown. The Kiwanians claim their pancakes are prepared on demand and never served cold.

THE ONLY QUESTION with this year's pancake festival is that the Kiwanians aren't sure whether they can top last year's feeding of 2,700 mouths.

"For the past 6-7 years we used to be busy only around meal times but lately we've been busy all the time," said Ron South, fellow Kiwanian. "Last year, it was slow only for one hour, between 4 and 5 p.m.

"We've had really good participation from folks in Plymouth. If we hope to do much better, we're gonna have to switch facilities because we pack 'em in the Masonic for 12 straight hours."

Last year's pancake extravaganza earned the Kiwanis Club more than \$2,500. The money went for flowers in Central Park, and youth and senior citizen projects. Wastebaskets and four park benches will be added to the park in front of Central Middle School by the Kiwanians in September, courtesy of last year's "Pancake Day."

Tickets can be purchased in advance for \$1.75 from any Kiwanian.
