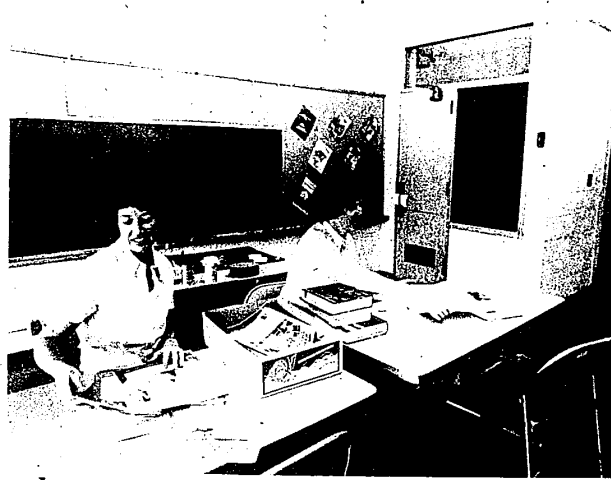


False prophecy

school completion courses, English for the foreign born, and a host of additional new services. Babysitting facilities are offered. A great many of the classes are without charge. Some are offered with discounts to senior citizens. A series of one-day



mini-workshops is on the new agenda. A senior adult education coordinator has been added to the staff. Space is available to clubs and local groups without charge. The school is at 3278 Ten Mile. The phone number is 474-5233. Registration for all fall classes

Fall library programs listed for children

Programs for children are all set to go at both Farmington Community Branch Libraries with registrations taken now for preschoolers through sixth graders continuing until Sept. 19.

In person registrations will be taken, or participants may register by phone, by calling the Hills branch at 333-4300, or the downtown branch at 474-7770.

The line-up at the Hills branch, located at 3273 Twelve Mile, includes preschool story hours, entitled "Mother goose on the Loose," for the three and four year old set on Wednesday mornings or afternoons, beginning Sept. 20.

For the four and five year olds, a creative dramatics program is set called "I'm Really Rosie" on Monday mornings, beginning Sept. 19. "I Can Make a Rainbow," involves crafts, stories and films, beginning Sept. 22 on Thursday afternoons.

There is a \$1 material fee for "I Can Make a Rainbow," otherwise, all of the above programs are free. After-school programs at the Hills branch, for first and second graders is a course in cooking called "Stone Soup."

The class centers around children's literature and recipes, and meets on Mondays, beginning Sept. 19. A materials fee of \$5 is asked at the time of registration.

For third and fourth graders, a creative writing program, called "Where the Sidewalk Ends," meets on Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 20.

Center asks for donations

Fifth and sixth graders are invited to "Creative Interpretation With Media." Children will be creating media programs through the use of photography and music. A \$5 materials fee will be asked for the Wednesday sessions, which begin Sept. 21, and participants must bring an instamatic camera to the meetings.

THE DOWNTOWN Farmington Branch, located at 2350 Liberty, offers much the same types of programs.

"Mother Goose on the Loose" begins Sept. 19 and 20 for three and four year olds and on Sept. 21 for four and five year olds.

Also for the four and five year olds, a program introducing the fundamentals of music called "Do You Hear What I Hear?" begins Sept. 19. "I Can Make a Rainbow" begins Sept. 20.

After school programs for first and second graders is called "Monster Mash" beginning Sept. 22. The Thursday class will rimmet with draw-

ing, tricks, crafts, games and make-up, all having to do with monster gags. A materials fee of \$2 is asked.

Third and fourth graders are invited to "Crazy Concoctions" on Wednesdays beginning Sept. 21 to make fun concoctions, secret solutions, and colorful, common and playful solutions. A \$2 fee is asked.

For the fifth and sixth graders, the program is called "Babysitter's Bag of Tricks." The participants meet on Tuesdays and learn some fine points of babysitting, and create their own babysitter's kit, filled with items guaranteed to amuse their charges. A \$1 materials fee is asked.

JUNIOR GREAT Books Discussion Groups for fifth graders meet on the first and third Thursdays of the month beginning Oct. 6 and the sixth graders meet on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month beginning Oct. 13. A \$1 fee, which covers the cost of the books to be read, can be paid at the time of registration in the downtown library.

Also in the downtown library, a "Reader's Roundtable" will be formed when fifth and sixth graders meet for informal discussions of current books and related materials, plus

activities. Information on the books to be discussed will be given the enrollees at the time of registration. The group will meet Mondays, starting in October.
