To make pay phone calling more convenient for the young and the handicapped, Michigan Bell lowered the height of 49,000 pay phones in the state; about 500 of them are in the Farmington area. Enclosed telephone booths are being phased out because they can be a hindrance to some handicapped people. They will be replaced by phones mounted on walls or metal poles.

# **Accused brothers** remain in jail

A pre-trial examination has been set for Sept. 22 for James Joseph Bel-cher. 33, and his brother Walter Bel-cher. 25, both of Farmingion Hills, who face a charge of assault with intent to kill.

Both men remained in Wayne Company to the set of the set o

Both men remained in Wayne County jail as of Friday afternoon. Bond was set at \$75,000 for James Belcher and \$50,000 for Walter Belcher.

The assault victim, according to Livonia police, is Donald Williams, who remained in guarded condition in St. Mary Hospital in Livonia as of Friday afternoon. Brain surgery was scheduled.

The two brothers were arraigned be-fore Judge James Mies in 18th Dis-trict Court last week on the charge.

Police gave this account of the in-cident which took place in the early hours of Sept. 11.

The Belcher brothers drove their station wagon past a party taking place on Melvin, south of Eight Mile in Livonia, involving about 200 young people.

Following a verbal exchange concerning the right of way, the Belchers and another driver. Clyde Hiner, 18, of Farmington Hills, stepped from their cars. One of the Belchers struck Hiner, knocking him to the ground.

WITNESSES HAVE told the police that Hiner was then kicked on the head and face, hit on the head with beer bottles and knocked unconscious. He was later taken to Providence Hospital with a broken jaw, cuts on his face that required plastic surgery, concussion and some memory loss. After the incident with Hiner, the Belchers then began to leave the

scene in their car when an unknown person' threw an object that hit the car, causing some damage. The two men stopped their vehicle and approached witnesses to find out who threw the object. But they left wilbout receiving an answer, stating Witnesses told the police the two men later came back to look for the individual who threw the object at their car. A few minutes later, they were seen leaving the backyard of the house with Williams walking between them, police said.

Thirty minutes later, Williams was found in a veant field near Morlock Street and taken to the hospital.
