Registrations are taken on a first-come-first-served basis and continue until the class is filled. The center's number is 477-8401.

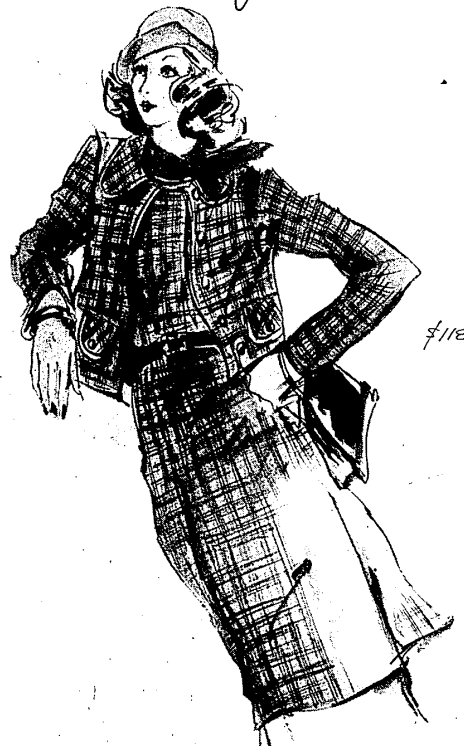
