

## **Brett Homovec** has big game as Hawks win

Farmington Harrison may not end up in the finals of the state Class A playoffs as It did last year, but its fans can expect plenty of exciting football as long as triple-threat quarterback Brett Hornowec keeps on producing as he did last Staturday.

Homowec, a 180-pound senior, had quite ad ay in leading Harrison to a 40-28 victory over Birmingham Groves in a non-league game on Harrison's turf. The result left both teams with 1-1 records.

Not only did Homovek icks a pair of school-record field goals of 47 and 48 yards, but he also completed 11 of 14 pass attempts for 224 yards. including a 62-yard touchdown strike to end Bert Barsch. Homowee scored three more TDs on runs of seven, one and two wards.

His is field goals shattered the old Harrison record of 42 yards set by Paul Rogind during the 1975 season. The 48-yarder was just six yards away from the state record established last year by Ecores's Derrick Underwood. Rogind, now a first-rate place kicker or the University of Minnesota, may have had something to do with Homovec's present success.

"I think Brett kind of learned how to kick from Paul, and then just prac-ticed on his own," said Harrison coach John Herrington. "I sure didn't teach him. I don't have the slightest idea how he does it."

"We were pleased with the way our offense came around," Herrington said. "We thought our receivers did an excellent job, Growes is so big, and we had a lot of trouble with them at the line of scrimmage. We had to go outside because we weren't having much luck up the middle.

"Defensively. Groves was tough up front. We couldn't run our lavorite off-tackie play very well. But we have some fine receivers and we gave Brett enough time to throw."

GROVES OPENED the scoring when Brian Almas ran eight yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. Bill Eberhart, a 5-foot-7 17b-pound junior halfback, scored three touchdowns on runs of 16 and 12 yards, and a 10-yard scoring pass from quarterback Byron Onisko.

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Eberhart also ran for a two-point conversion, and Onisko threw to Jim McKenna for another.

Groves opens its Metro Suburban Association season on Friday (Sept. 23) at home against Rochester Adams. Game time is 8 p.m.

Harrison begins its Western Six League campaign on Saturday (Sept. 21) at home against Walfeld Lake Western. The game starts at 2 p.m.
