Voice vote carries day

Legion leaders blast Panama treaty

President Carter's Panama Canal treaty is facing some stiff opposition from veterans' groups across the coun-try, and Farmington area members of the American Legion are no exception. "We're against it." said Ben Kokko. Commander of the Groves-Walker Post 346 in Farmington. "The majority are in favor of the national position acainst the treaty."

are in favor of the national position against the treaty." Although about 40 of the post's 184 members didn't take a formal vote on the subject, no one spoke in favor of the treaty during a recent discussion, said Kokko, a Farmington Hills resi-dent dent

dent. At the county level. opposition was formally voiced. "Were against giving the Panama Canal away." said Charles Currie. a Farmington Hills resident and Com-mander of the 18th District, which covers 21 posts in Oakland County. "We discussed it as a group. and we

took a voice vote," said Currie. "In this case. there was nobody for it," he explained. About 200 members were at the meeting, he said. Currie personally backs the state legion's position as stated by Verona L.
