The Oakland County Intermediate School District recently "bought" the Southwest Oakland Voacational Education Center (SWOVEC) on Beck Road from the Walled Lake schools and three other districts for four dollars.

what sounds like the real estate deal What sounds like the real estate deal of the century was actually legal maneuver enabling the intermediate district to borrow \$1.8 million to continue operating the center.

The SWOVEC title. transferred to the intermediate district until 1884, will serve as collateral for the intermediate collateral for the intermediate schools loan.

Clariston, Royal Oak, and Pontiac districts, which also hold title to SWO-VEC, have already approved the title transfer.

The title transfer will not affect cur-rent operations in any way, said Walled Lake Deputy Superintendent Rolland Langerman.

There will be no millage increase either in the intermediate or the local

either in the intermediate or the local districts.

The title will revert to the local districts once the intermediate district pays off the bonds, he added.

Walled Lake Planning Commission Chairman Kenneth Tucker asked what would happen if the intermediate schools did not pay off their loan by 1894.

"Then we'd have to discuss an amendment to the amendment to the original agreement." Langerman responded.

## Walled Lake secures loan

To meet its cash flow needs in anticipation of state aid payments, the Walled Lake School District is borrowing \$2.87 million from the Community National Bank of Pontiac.

The school board recently accepted the bank's low bid of 3.41 percent interest, which will cost the district at 100 to 200 ft.

interest, which will cost the district \$91,982.23. The loan is due on September 1, 1978, according to Harry Carlson, business manager. According to Carlson the bank's bid fell below the 3.6-3.7 percent rate had originally anticiapted. He attributed the low bid to advice given the district by the Michigan School Business Officials Investment Association.

Although membership in the association cost the district \$1,450, Carlson estimated that the group's saved the district some \$4,200 in interest on the current loan.
