Currently the cutoff is \$3,000; under this legislation it will rise gradually to \$5,000 in 1902 and be eliminated after that year. OL Road widening gets hearing

A public hearing is planned for February to gather citizens comments on the proposed widening of Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills and West Bloomfield Township, announced John L. Grubba, Oakland County Road Commission managing director.

Grubba said reconstruction of rchard Lake Road from a two-lane to Orchard Lake toda from a two-lane to a five-lane pavement between Twelve Mile and Fifteen Mile roads is a major goal of the road commission's pro-posed 1978 construction program. He said the 2.8 mile project is sched-uled for \$3.2 million of the road com-

pated federal aid. The remainder of costs would be shared 50-50 by the road commission and local units of government, he said.

"This much-needed road improve-ment has been designated a "major impact" project by the Federal High-way Administration, and thus requires an involved environmental impact review," said Grubba.

"The public hearing, which is a part of the review process, will be held at the conclusion of federal and state approvals of early steps in the pro-cedure," he said. "We appear to be ahead of schedule

in the environmental impact review, and it may be possible to get as far as contract letting and some initial construction work in 1978. But it does not appear likely that full construction will be under way before 1979. Said the road commission's managing director.

He noted that widening of Orchard Lake Road is a high priority improve-ment project because of heavy traffic volumes, which are largely generated by an interchange with 1-696 near Twelve Mile. The route's congestion is further compounded by turning move-ments at mile-road intersections and along the project length, he said.


