MERCY'S MacMILLAN, who is just a sophomore, made the first team in two individual events, the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard breaststroke.

Her IM clocking of 2:14.3, good for second place at the state finals, placed her ahead of Groves' Karen Rempal (2:18.3) and Mercy's Button (2:20.6).

MacMillan also took second place in the breaststroke finals at the state meet with a time of 1:10.1 Farmington High's Sally Schueler (1:12.8) and Birmingham Marian's Colleen Duris (1:15.4) finished second and third respectively on the O&E All Area team.

Kalhy Krull of Rochester Adams was second at 1:58.6, and Loir Piresarer of Groves was third at 2:01.3. in the 50-yard freestyle, Groves' Krysten Ryndress, who finished fourth in the state finals with a :25.2, was the top pick. Teammate Betsy McCarvill

was second (:25.6) and Adams' Carol Strayer was third (:25.7). Erin Smith, Another Groves girl, Erin Smith, came up with the first-team honor in the diving event. She scored 367.30 points at the state finals and finished eventh. Amy Rogers of Birmingham Seaholim was the second-team pick with 361.06 points, and Hillary Marchael of Marian was third with 253.70.

ONE OF THE three deviations from the Groves-Mercy slate was Andover's Keopke in the 100-yard butterfly. She made the first team in that event with a 1:02.3 followed by Southfield-Lath-rup's Lisa Hess (1:03.6) and Farm-ington High's Denise McKinnon (1:05.1).

The Highlanders finished second in the Metro-Subrban Athletic Association (MSAA) behind perennial champion Birmingham Groves—a team which stuck the Highlanders with their only loss this year. In splashing through the season with 12 wins, Adams qualified eight swimmers for the class-A finals at Kalamazzo.

AFTER GOING scoreless at the 1976 state finals, Adams regrouped this year to finish with 35 points—its highest point total in history. In 1974 Adams finished 14th in the state, and
