# Schoolcraft Invitational draws area matmen

A host of powerful grapplers will clash on the mats tomorrow and Saturday at the eighth annual Schoolcraft College Wrestling Invitational.

Twenty-eight high school teams are expected to participate, including 17 from the Observer & Eccentric area.

The meet begins at noon tomorrow and is expected to continue until approximately 10 p.m. Saturday's first session is scheduled to run from noon to 5:30 p.m. Finals are slated for 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Tickets, available at the door, are \$1 for students and \$1.50 for adults per session. Schoolcraft is at 1800 Hag-

erty, between Six and Seven Mile. The invitational will be held in the main gymnasium with up to six matches in progress at one time.

Westland John Glenn defeated Wayne by a slim 5/4 point margin for the team championship last year. That competition finished on a controversial note when Bill Meyer, wrestling in the 134-pound class for Glenn, was slammed to the mat by Wayne's Tim Clark in the finals. Bob Lusk, coach of the Rockets, said he was reluctant to let his dazed grappler continue.

According to high school rules,

Meyer was awarded the victory and those points helped Glenn take the title.

Bitter rivals, the Rockets and Zebras will be back this weekend, along with other O&E-area teams Plymouth Salem, Plymouth Canton, Farmington, Farmington Harrison, North Farmington, Southfield, Southfield-Lathrup and Birmingham Groves.

Also battling will be Clarenceville, Livonia Stevenson, Livonia Franklin, Livonia Churchill, Livonia Bentley, Redford Union, Redford Thurston and

Garden City West.

Farmington, which finished third behind Glenn and Wayne last year, will be led by the Stern brothers—Ron and Randy. Ron was individual champion at 100 pounds.

Lathrup's Rob Parent, who took the individual title at 121 pounds last year, will be on hand to defend his championship.

Clarenceville, a Class B school, placed fourth in last year's competition and will be led this weekend by Kevin Respecki, Eric Black and Mike Crilly.

Harrison, which finished sixth last season, has a pair of solid matmen in Kevin Suetterlin and Pat Palajac. Thurston, undefeated so far this season, has a handful of capable grapplers including Buddy Ault, Tom Arsenault and Brian Gies.

Rene Leist and Bob Dasher are among Salem's quality performers, while Kyle Heaton and Tom Harred are among Canton's best.

Other matmen who will be leading their teams into the arena are John and Jim Cotter, North Farmington; Glenn Taggart and Vince Flippo, Garden City West; and Jerome Robinson, Tim O'Neil and Greg Potulski, Glenn. Dan Groh and Wayne Hope have been making progress at Stevenson through the early part of the season and Terry Madden has been wrestling well for Churchill.

# Adams' Mallon named top coach

the following year the Highlanders were 18th.

"Competing in the state finals is a scary thing," said Mallon, whose team is 22-3 through the past two years. "The girls know they are going against swimmers who have all had good coaches."

"Everyone is good at the state finals, and not just two or three girls like you have in a dual meet," she said. "You have heard about most of the girls swimming at state, and there is a tremendous amount of pressure."

The fourth-year coach had to over-

come a few nagging problems earlier in the season. Because of an illness which swept through the team, most of the Highlander girls who had qualified for the Detroit News swim meet were unable to attend.

The Highlanders also had pool difficulties which forced them to use the neighboring Rochester facility for the MSAA swim championships in November.

"Using the Rochester pool wasn't bad, but it was an inconvenience," said Mallon. "But, on the whole, everything worked out well for us."

Mallon helped to rebuild the Adams

swim program, and this year will be the second graduating class that she's tailored since they were sophomores. She says the main difference between the younger and older swimmers is fundamental—although a lot of young swimmers are more improved because they are involved with year-round programs.

"I think basically a coach has to divide things up, working on conditioning and the finer points of swimming with the older swimmers, and working on things like turns and pushing off the wall with the newer swimmers," she said.

"I think coaching is a building and teaching process. You have to teach the kids to do the best that they can, to

### SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL MEETING

December 19, 1977

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills met in special session at City Hall on December 19, 1977 at 7:30 P.M. Council Members present were: Amorl, Deacon, Dolan, Dudley, and Smith. Mr. Oppenheimer was absent. City Manager, City Clerk, City Attorney, Planning Consultant, and City Attorney Donohue.

Others present were City Manager Majors, City Clerk Cairns, Planning Consultant Oakes and City Attorney Donohue.

After Public Hearing, necessary was declared and Special Assessment Roll in the amount of \$26,940 for Nine Mile and Halsted Road paving project was unanimously confirmed.

After Public Hearing, a resolution to vacate an alley lying south of Stocker Street, west of Farmington Road between lots 161 through 169 and 170 of Fierings Roseland Park was adopted by a vote of 4 to 1. Mr. Deacon opposed.

Public Hearing on Amended Ordinance No. C82-110 a request to rezone lots 601 through 608 of Grand River Crest Subdivision No. 2 located between Byron and Grand River Avenue on the west side of St. Francis Street from Single Family Residential use (RA-2) to Multiple Family Residential use (RC-3) was postponed.

After Public Hearing, the introduction of Amended Ordinance No. C82-118 a request to rezone 2 1/2 acres between Nine and Ten Mile Roads adjacent to 2400 Halsted Road from Single Family Residential use (RA-1) to Single Family Residential use (RA-2) was unanimously denied.

After Public Hearing, introduction of Amended Ordinance No. C82-117 a request to rezone 83.85 acres located on the southwest corner of Halsted and Nine Mile Roads from Single Family Residential use (RA-1) to Single Family Residential use (RA-2) was unanimously denied.

After Public Hearing, introduction of Amended Ordinance No. C82-118 a request to rezone approximately 2.24 acres located at 2315 Halsted Road from Single Family Residential use (RA-1) to Single Family Residential use (RA-2) was unanimously denied.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-119 a request to rezone property located on the west side of Orchard Lake Road between 12 and 13 Mile Roads (Labell Lighting) from Light Industrial use (LI-1) to Business Service use (B-3) and Parking use (P-1) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-120 a request to rezone property located on the southwest corner of 12 Mile and Orchard Lake Roads from Business Service use (B-2) to Expressway Service use (ES) was approved by a vote of 3 to 2. Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Dolan opposed.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-121 a request to rezone the northeast corner of 10 Mile and Middlebelt Roads from Business Service use (B-3) to Office Service use (OS-1) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-122 a request to rezone part of lots 1 and 2 of Supervisors Plat Eight Mile Grand River Acres Subdivision No. 1 located on the northeast corner of 8 Mile and Orchard Lake Roads from Light Industrial use (LI-1) to Business Service District use (B-3) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-123 a request to rezone lot 56 of Farmington Acres Subdivision located west of 123rd Road, north of Eight Mile Road from Office Service District use (OS-1) to Business Service District use (B-3) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-124 a request to rezone lots 68 of Builders Park Subdivision located north of Boetwick, west of Farmington Road from Business Service District use (B-3) to Single Family Residential use (RA-4) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-125 a request to rezone lots 68 of Builders Park Subdivision located south of Nine Mile, west of Farmington Road from Business Service District use (B-3) to Business Service District use (B-1) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amended Ordinance No. C82-126 a request to rezone lots 12 and 13 Mile Roads, west of Drake including escrow deposit in the amount of \$10,653.78 was unanimously approved.

Resolution of Senior Adult Transportation Service contract with Northwest Transport, Inc. for a period of 90 days beginning January 9, 1978 was unanimously approved.

Acceptance of 6 acres as a gift from Rosald and John Haasway located on the east side of Drake Road between Freedom Road and Grand River Avenue was approved by a vote of 4 to 1. Mrs. Dudley opposed.

Resolution of intent to issue bonds in the amount of \$1,000,000 and to enter into a lease agreement with the Partridge Hills Building Authority for the purchase of the San Marino Golf Course located on the east side of Halsted Road between 11 and 12 Mile Roads was unanimously approved.

Motion to conduct an Executive Session immediately following Council meeting to discuss land acquisition was unanimously approved.

Necessity Hearing date reset and Cost Hearing date set for December 19, 1977 for Special Assessment District for the Nine Mile and Halsted Road paving project.

Presentation by Planning Commissioners Shirley Stadler, and Fred Hughes of a request from the Michigan Society of Planning Officials for the City's design to preserve open space through use of Planned Unit Development (PUD) and Planned Residential Development (PRD) zoning ordinances.

SRP (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority) has shelter locations approved by City Attorney directed to negotiate a reasonable termination clause before participation agreement is signed.

Request from Angles, Inc. located at 38068 Orchard Lakes Road to redeem stockholders shares in a 1977 Class C licensed business with Dance Permit was unanimously approved.

Deletion of Lots 22 and 24 of Supervisors' Murr Farms Subdivision from the Special Assessment Roll No. 10 unanimously approved.

Business license application fees unanimously approved.

Financial commitment in the amount of \$20 per month for a period not to exceed 6 months to the Partridge Hills Building Authority for the purchase of the San Marino Golf Course located on the east side of Halsted Road between 11 and 12 Mile Roads was unanimously approved.
