Forceful teacher again in 'The Corn Is Green'

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Jeanne Arnold adds another lustrous performance to her acting accomplishments at Meadow Brook Theatre as the hard-driving Miss Moffat in Emlyn Williams' "The Corn Is Green."

Miss Arnold's Miss Moffat requires only a touch more tendemess. As Morgan Exars, the clever young miner with quick wit and mind, Michel Callien is called upon to give a performance that shows a great range of acting abilities.

Mis Moffat invests her time and dreams in Morgan, relentlessly turning him from an uncouth youth, whose destiny is preparationed, into a student with great promise vying for a scholarship to Oxford.

CULLEN MUST display sensitivity and quick responses, and he does. We see Morgan change, over a period of three years, his mind nearly always ready for more knowledge.

Film will transport armchair travelers

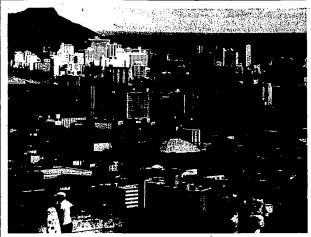


Acrobatic dolphins and jumping whales at Sea Life Park are photographed by Dr. Taylor, who appears in right foreground.

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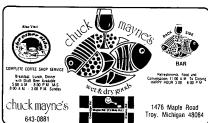
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
