Another North Farmington wrestler, Bob Petroff, finished fourth in the 134-pound division, finally losing to Farm-ington's Lou Milani, 5-4, in the con-solation match.

Milani, who finished third at 134, lost to Wayne Memorial's Gordy Bachus, 12.2. before bedting Harrison's Mark Schwab, 1-0. Farmington's Fagan, who-landed in fourth place at 140, lost to Memorial's Chris Bachus, 8-3.

McKibben's 27 points can't save Farmington

Plymouth Canton exploded for 28 points in the final quarter and coasted to a 78-61 non-league backets.

points in the final quarter and coasted to a 78-61 non-league basketball victory over Farmington Tuesday night at Canton.

The victory was the second straight for the Chiefs, evening their overall record to 4-4 this season. The Falcons from Farmington dropped to 3-7.

The difference in Tuesday's contest was Canton's ability to penetrate on offense and dominate the boards at both ends of the floor against the smaller and weaker Farmington squad.

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The Falcons, coached by first-year mentor Rich Roy, were hurt on the front line with the loss of two starters because of illness. Only the outstanding play of Rick McKibben, who led all scorers with 27 points, kept Farmington within striking range late in the third quarter.

The Falcons grabbed a narrow 13-12 rist-quarter lead which featured solo performances by McKibben and Canton's Russ Mandle. McKibben accounted for rine points in that initial quarter, while Mandle's fancy inside moves produced 10 of the Chiefs' 12 points.

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Junior guard Butch King netted 10 points in the second quarter to spark Canton to a 25-11 advantage, giving the Plymouth squad a 37-24 halftme lead. Roy admitted his squad lost the game after that second quarter.

Farmington came back strong, however, pulling within four points late in the third quarter thanks to a full-court zone press which bothered the Chiefs.
