The high scoring that has prevailed throughout the entire area has brought about a jump in the number of perfect games compared to the number bowled at this time last year.

Figures released by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association this week revealed that thus far 20 perfect games have been bowled compared to 14 a year ago.

Strangely, the number of 299 games remained about the same with eight in record now compared to seven last January.

The bowlers are still a long way from the record, but with the high

scoring now taking place, there could be a new mark by season's end.

THE METROPOLITAN DETROIT B'nai B'rith will host one of the most unusual tournaments scheduled this season when more than 1,200 bowlers from all sections of the country gather to compete in the International B'nai B'rith tournament.

Because the tournament is scheduled for only two weekends, starting March 11 and 12, the event will be held in four different establishments—Drakeshire Lanes in Farmington, Thunderbird Lanes in Troy, Hartfield

Lanes in Berkley and Fairlains in Madison Heights.

It is the first tournament ever held in this area that covered four cities.

THERE HAS BEEN little concern, of late, over the Brother Rice basketball team's ability to win. As long as Tim Andree is getting his 23 points and 15 rebounds, nobody should really be worried.

But at Ferndale Tuesday, Andree committed three fouls in the first four minutes and spent much of the remainder of the nonleague game on the bench.

Brother Rice proved it does have some balance, however, as the Warriors defeated Ferndale, 56-53 for its ninth victory in 10 games.

Mike Henry helped eliminate the concern over Andree's absence by scoring 16 points and pulling down 13 rebounds. Andree finished with 15 points in limited action.

The quick Ferndale defense forced Brother Rice into 10 turnovers and

stole the ball seven more times, causing Rice coach Bill Norton to have a lengthy team meeting afterwards.

The Warriors will have to be practically mistake-free Friday when they travel to Catholic Central for the first of two meetings of the two chief Catholic League Central Division powers. A win for Rice, now 4-0 in the league,

would go a long way toward deciding the division title.

Ferndale, led by Daryl Robinson who pumped in 22 points, kept the game close until Joe Parke's two free throws decided the game with 11 seconds left.

The loss dropped Ferndale's record to 5-4.

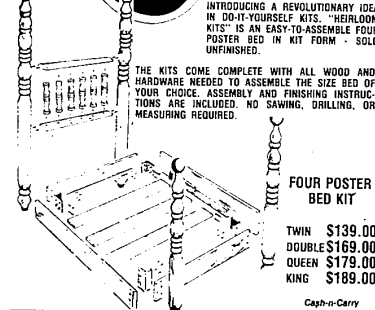
