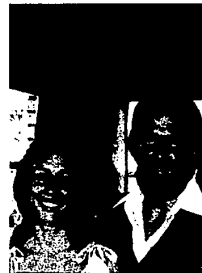

Aspiring thespians called to classes

The Farmington Community Center is offering a dramatics program geared for youth this winter. All of the classes will be taught by Georganne Sudgen.

The instructor's background includes a masters degree in theatre arts, and three years abroad in the Conservatoire de l'Art Dramatique in Paris, where she studied under the renowned mime Marcel Maceau.

For the past 10 years she has taught high school and college theatre in California and Kentucky.

She is considered a specialist in the field of children's theatre, having traveled as an artist-in-residence for the National Endowment for the Arts Commission.

Mrs. Sudgen will teach creative dramatics for pre-schoolers and for first-to-third graders, where the emphasis will be on play-making, pantomime


and creative movement. Simple makeup, costumes, props and scenery painting will be included.

A BEGINNING acting workshop will expose fourth-to-sixth graders to both improvisational and scripted theatre, where they will learn about character development, blocking, set dressing and theatrical makeup.

Weekend outings to the theatre will also be included.

An acting and mime workshop for seventh-to-ninth graders among the dramatic class offerings winds up with an evening of mime and improvisational theatre presented for parents and friends.


