a four bedroom home, it would produce 3.2 children just doesn't hold true anymore."

The district would require phenomenal growth and a phenomenal collapse of the parochial school system to offset the large decline in student enrollment, he said.

He said that while Farmington's three high schools currently are operating at optimum (educationally and fiscally) capacity, by 1981-82, that would no longer be true. Farmington High School is projected to decrease from 87 per cent capacity now to 66 per cent in '81, while Harri-

son High, hardest hit by declining enrollment with a 74 per cent capacity currently, would have a 57 per cent capacity enrollment in 1981, given current projections, he said.

"Farmington is unique in the state in that it is looking at this problem," he said, adding that many school districts have been "caught with their pants down."

One of the task force's jobs, he emphasized, is to plan for the impact of declining enrollment at the junior and senior high level, where the closing of schools is an expensive proposition.


