The How And Why Behind Election: Consolidation Ballot Rulings

The Farmington area has aiready made one historic move in the state and may be ready to take another historic step.

THE FIRST historic stepwast taken March 24, 1969 when, Citizens For A Better Farmington presented petitions to the State Boundary Commission asking for consolidation and two villages in the Farmington area to be Farmington area with the state Boundary Commission after reviewing the petitions, the commission action and set the election for Nov. 4.

In the resolution calling for the election, the commission are included two requirements for charter commissioners which

are being questioned by Farm-ington Township officials,

The resolution called for the election of nine charter commissioners on the Nov. 4 hallot. The commission specified that candidates must have been residents in the Farminston area since March 24, 1966.

The commission also specified that elected or appointive officials of the four governments could not run for the charter commission, unless, of course, they resigned from their governmental positions.

TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES expressed dismay over those requirements and instructed Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan to investigate the leg-

Fred Lichtman questioned the commission's right to specify that elected or appointed of-ficials could not be charter candidates. He also expres-sed displeasure over the res-idency requirement of three Lichtman asked Brennan to check if the prohibitions came to me sixthin terislation on it

And there really no reason to believe the fulligent laymen, with advice or consultants and recommendations of government of ficials, cannot write an excellent charter.

IF A LAWSUIT is filed, if will be filled with the State Court of Appeals since it would challenge a state statue.

It is dangerous to try to guess the outcome of a law-suit, but of the two provisions, the residency requirement would probably be the hardest to defend.
