Oakway cabaret adopts Spanish sun

Show music from many countries— and particularly sunny Spain—will be on tap when the Oakway Symphon. Orthestra presents its annual cabaret concert at 8 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 11. Place will be the Activities Building of Madonna College, 1-36 (Jeffries) reeway at Levan in Livonia. Some tickets are still available, according to 600 leaders. The cabaret is separate from the regular subscription series. Guest arists include two singers, two flamenco dancers, a classical gui-tarist, a pianist, four nuns performing with sandpaper, and a guest conductor.
