OU matmen look toward tourney

If the barometer to success is improvement, the Oxland University men's wrestling team is headed in the right direction.

For the first time in its brief three-year history, the Pioneer wrestling team has finished the dual meet season over the break-even mark. Oxland ended its 1977-78 campaign with an overall 7-5 mark, compared to last year's 6-7 slate.

an overall 7-5 mark, comparen to tass year's 6-7 slites, a record-number of eight wrestlers have qualified for the NCAA Division II National Wrestling Finals, to be held at the University of Northern Iowa. The championships will take place at the Cedar Falls campus during the March 4-5 week-end.

Leading the list of national qualifiers for Oakland is Phil Lieblang.

The second-year Pioneer wrestler is a repeat qualifier, who, last year, was the first to earn points for Oakland the first to earn points for Oakland (2½) in the nationals as he advanced to the quarterfinals. The former East Detroit High School student was voted the most valuable wrestler at Oakland last year for that effort.

This season, Lieblang has lost only once in dual meets, (to Mark Chouc-


