As a member of the Wolverine Bike Club he rode the distance from Lan-sing to the Mackinac Bridge about three years ago. After his brain surgery, he rode 25 miles for the Cancer Society. "He was an all around man," his wife Marie, said. "Even after he had brain surgery, he took trigonometry classes at Schoolcraft," said Squair's widow, Marie.
