

Cavanagh Loss Won't Halt Stadium Drive

Mayor Cavanagh's decision not to seek a third term as Detroit's chief executive will in no way effect the drive for a modern sports stadium on the river-front site.

No sooner had he spoken the words that, after eight years under heavy pressure, the time has come to spend more time with his boys, than those close to the sports scene whispered — "there goes the downtown stadium."

From his office, high up in the City County Building, Mayor Cavanagh had been driving hard against all attempts to select the State Fairgrounds or some suburban site.

In this desire for the civic center location Mayor Cavanagh enlisted the services of the Detroit Board of Commerce to conduct a feasibility study and asked that all avenues be traveled that would lead to the downtown site.

"THINGS HAVEN'T changed a bit," Merritt Martin, assistant to President Dwight Davis, of the Board of Commerce, confided.

"We are into this study as the Board of Commerce," he pointed out, "and it will be carried out no matter who the mayor might be. We have been given the job and we are in the process of doing it."

Martin disclosed that work on the feasibility study has been moving right along.

"And it looks at this stage as though the stadium could be built in the downtown location," he confided.

The first phase of the study, according to Martin, will be ready in mid-August and it will be at least six months later when the final report of the study can be made.

"FROM ALL REPORTS we are getting," Martin continued, "the downtown stadium could do the same kind of a job in stimulating business that Cobo Hall has done."

"The stadium would lead, from the reports we get, to a new growth of business on the 80-acre site, but we won't know the real potential until the study is completed."

Meanwhile, the Tourist and Convention Bureau, in its latest Newsletter, has gone on record with the statement that "Downtown Detroit needs the additional development and revitalization of a new stadium will provide."

The Bureau's point of view after a study is made of all economic factors, it comes down to a matter of civic pride.

Bureau President Thomas R. Reid stated, "I rely on Detroiters to give us the invitation to their own regional and national sports association to meet in Detroit. It might be alive, revitalized downtown area would be a new stadium."

Increase Detroit's pride in their city and significantly contribute to our convention sales program."

WHETHER MAYOR CAVANAGH's decision would play a part in either the Detroit Tigers or the Detroit Lions, attitude on a stadium site is problematical.

Both teams will be tenants. William Clay Ford, Lions owner, has hinted, from time to time, that he might favor a site in Southfield, but he never has made a firm statement.

John Fetzer, the Tiger owner, is keeping his options open, waiting to see what sort of plan can be evolved for the present Tiger Stadium at Michigan and Trumbull.

Meanwhile, The Detroit Board of Commerce, is continuing with the feasibility study — just as though Mayor Cavanagh never had uttered a word of his decision not to seek a third term.

Swan Club Races Get Top Pilots

Coach, Turf, Offense-- All New For Wolverines

Many of the leading speed drivers in the middle west will be in the fleet on Sunday, July 6, when it answers the starter's gun in the annual race that will feature Homecoming Day at the Swan Boat Club at Newport, just a bit north of Monroe.

Entries are expected from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky, and competition is expected to be keener than ever in the 1969 will earn points toward the American Power Boat Association's national championship.

A creek course is considered ideal for the hydroplanes and every class, with 60-odd, in the unlimited boats, will be in the time trials runs that get under way shortly before noon and continue through the day.

Speeds up to 100 miles an hour are expected by the seven liter boats.

The regatta is the closing event of the three day homecoming regatta at the club on July 4-6, and the Midwest Sky Divers will take over the regatta program. This will take place for the speedboat drivers to furnish the final thrill on Sunday.

University of Michigan football will be surrounded with "newness" this fall as the first head coaching change in a decade, a remodeled offense and a spectacular alteration in Michigan Stadium.

Bo Schembechler, the "belly officer" and Tartan Turf are the newest ingredients in Michigan football.

They move along side the \$75,000 twin scoreboards installed last season and the increase in parking areas in a series of rapid changes made here in the last 12 months.

THE LATEST INNOVATION, and one Athletic Director Don Canham feels the fans will enjoy, is wall-to-wall synthetic grass that seems to magnify the football action. Tartan Turf is being placed over the 83,000 square feet of interior surface of Michigan Stadium.

"It's remarkable how different a football game looks when it's played on this artificial surface," Canham noted. "Weather no longer will be a factor."

Michigan's new football coach, Bo Schembechler, was

equally pleased with the decision to carpet the stadium.

"However, this fall as the first of cutting injuries, it will make the game faster," he claims. "The offensive linemen literally shoot off the line and the defense and the receivers can really go on this surface," added Schembechler, who takes over the Michigan football post from Bump Elliott, now associate athletic director.

Because the Tartan Turf gives the offense an advantage, defenses will have to be quicker in reaching. This also is a plus for Michigan, which returns a highly mobile veteran defensive team.

"WE ARE NOT LARGE on defense," admits Schembechler, "but in our system, we would rather have quickness than size."

This is especially true of the Wolverines defense, which features Tom Curtis, a second-year All-American last season who set a Big Ten pass interception record.

Curtis is 6-1 and 189-pound safety, while the two defensive backs are smaller, Brian Healy, a three-year regular, is 6-1, 170, and Tom Darden is 6-1 1/2, 185. The other back, Barry Pierson, is 6 feet, 175.

Schembechler has installed the "belly offense" at Michigan. This requires the fullback to handle much of the running as well as the wingback. Michigan operated with the I-formation last year and will retain some of its best backs again with Junior Don Moorhead at the controls.

THE DEMAND for tickets for Michigan's six home games has

been unusually heavy this season. The Wolverines open Sept. 6 against Vanderbilt in the 101,001-seat stadium and play Washington, nationally ranked Missouri and Purdue on successive Saturdays.

Michigan meets Michigan State at East Lansing and Minnesota on the road, entertains Wisconsin Nov. 1 and travels to Illinois and Iowa. The season finale could be another tie

showdown with Ohio State, defending national champions, here Nov. 22.
