

WANTS TO BE CIRCUIT JUDGE Judge Kleber P. Rockwell of the Probate Court has announced his candidacy in another column for the nomination at the March primary on the Republican ticket for the office of Oakland County's

Circuit Judge.
Judge Rockwell was elected Judge of Probate last fall for the third term, leading his ticket by a large majority, and seems to have given universal satisfaction in that capacity, as he has in a number of other responsible posi-

tions in the past.

He was born in Bloomfield He was born in Bloomined township on November 8, 1868. His boyhood was spent on the farm; later teaching school for a humber of years, when he took up the study of law, and was admitted to the bar in 1895. In November, 1898, he was elected Prosecuting Attorney of Oakland county, in which capacity he served for three terms, declining the fourth.

He served as a member of the the served as a member of the state constitutional convention in 1907-8, having received the port of both Republicans and Democrats of the Twelfth Senatorial District, in the nomination and election to that position, where he served on the judiciary and public utilities committees

Budge Rockwell is a member of the State Probate Judges as-sociation, having served as its president; is a member of the Michigan State Bar association. and was a law partner of Hon.

H. M. Zimmerman up to the time
of his election as Probate Judge in 1908: a member of the K B. F. O. E., the First Congregational church of Pontiac, a staunch Republican, and a general all-around good fellow.
