Fire at the Home of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Smith Mon-day Morning.

Monday morning Oscar Smith, living on the corner of Church and Shiawassee streets, opposite the Methodist church, discovered his water pipes to be frozen. Go-ing to the basement with a kerosene torch he attempted to warm the pipes enough to start the ater running.

Except for a hole cut in the bathroom and on the outside very little damage was done, which is covered by insurance.
