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

The Age Limit on Jurors.

(From the Oxford Leader.)

Under the heading, "The Judging," by Judge Smith, attention is called to the qualifications of jurors as to their age in excusing a course he has exercised yearly before the Board of Supervisors by his admonitions not to send in names of men who are above sixty years of age, on account of their being too old to serve as jurors.

Just why he does not feel proud of this course at this time to his aversion in the past to men serving in his Court who happened to be sixty years of age is apparent to all. Sections 335 and 336 M. C. L. from which he quotes exempts school teachers, practicing physicians, ministers of the gospel, attorneys at law, certain township, county and state officers and men sixty years of age from serving as jurors; nevertheless, the statute does not prohibit any of the above from serving as jurors if they are chosen to serve.

The Supreme Court of our State, in construing this statute (before Judge Smith was appointed to the Circuit Bench), held in the case of the People vs. Rayn. (90 Mich., page 377), "a juror is not subject to a challenge for cause because he is over sixty years of age, and therefore exempt from jury duty, the right to claim exemption being a personal privilege of the juror."

The new Judiciary Act which became operative last year and to which he refers, makes no change as to the qualifications of jurors except to the privilege of the juror from sixty years to sixty-five.

We noted the Judge seeks to excuse his course with the further comment that, "It is a matter of small consequence, because upon the average not over half a dozen jurors per year are drawn who are

over age and some of these prefer to be excused." While Judge Smith doubts, has regarded it as "a matter of small consequence" in singling out men from the list of exempt who were sixty years of age from having as jurors yet, it is a matter of considerable consequence to the individual whose personal privilege to serve as a juror was involved. We assume the same "a matter of small consequence" will be left to the individual March 7th to pass up in the fit and proper time.
