To the Electors of Oakland County:

As the campaign for the nomination of Circuit Judge draws to a close I wish to thank the friends in all parts of the county for their assistance and kindly words of advice.

I would very much liked to have made a personal canvass, and expressed my appreciation personally for their kindness in the past, but on account of my official duties I find it impossible at this time.

As is known to many of my friends I have entertained an ambition for a number of years to serve my district as Circuit Judge. This ambition, with the best of good faith, was relinquished by me in the past, and if the electors feel that I am qualified and worthy of promotion, their support at the primaries next Wednesday will be much appreciated.

The nature and method of the campaign conducted by my opponent and myself is pretty generally known to all. I have endeavored to conduct my campaign in keeping with the office involved, and have never believed that it served to establish my own fitness for public service by maligning or to speak of my opponent in derision. While he has sought to make political capital out of the fact that certain men are not lending him their support at this time, whom he has solicited and felt proud to have with him in the past, and further, that I should not aspire for advancement while holding the Probate Judgeship. Let me say in reply, first, that it is not due to any act of mine that certain Republicans refuse to support him longer; and second, that in recent years judicial advancement of this nature has become as well recognized as has the practice for a Circuit Judge to be promoted to the Supreme Court Judgeship.

With something like twenty-two years in the active practice, enforcement and interpretation of the law in the various courts, I am aspiring for this position fully mindful of its duties and responsibilities. If nominated and elected, the duties of the office will receive my entire attention. It will be my ambition to perform the duties of the office with impartiality and economy at all times, that justice and law enforcement may obtain.

I trust that the voters may find time to attend primaries and tender me their support, which will be greatly appreciated.
