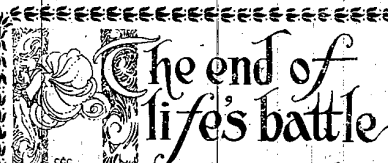

THE MATTER OF SEED

In the coming planting season the state of Michigan will require a million bushels of seed potatoes—an average of 400,000 acres to be planted.

The above figures represent the average number of bushels planted each season, and if the "vacant lot" movement is inaugurated in the cities and small towns to any extent, a much larger acreage and number of bushels of seed will be required. Where is the seed coming from?

If a potato famine is averted next winter it behooves every man who can procure a piece of ground to plant it to potatoes. In the Pingree movement in Detroit, potatoes were worth 35 and 40 cents a bushel, but people were out of work and could not get money to procure the tubers. At the present time every man who wishes employment has all he can do, but the tubers are so scarce that it is almost impossible to procure them at any price, the result being practically identical—potato hunger, and potatoes are a large part of almost every family's living.

The "plant a patch" movement is worthy of the consideration of every city, village and individual, and the problem of seed for the small patch can be easily overcome if a little systematic conservation of seed is practiced, with very small cost to each family.

When you procure your next "peck" of "spuds" for the family use, or as soon as the potatoes begin to sprout, cut out the "eyes" of each potato as a mess is prepared for cooking and put them away for planting time. The process will take but little of the eating part of your "peck of potatoes," and will in the course of a week or two furnish seed enough to plant quite a patch.
