Notice is hereby given to the qualified
electors of the Village of Farmington,
County of Oakland and State of Michi-
gan that the next ensuing village elec-
tion will be held at Firemen's Hall (water
works building), within said village, on

Monday, March 12, A. D. 1917,
at which election the following officers
are to be chosen, viz:

One Village President; One Village
Clerk; One Village Treasurer; Three
Trustees for two years and One Assessor.

The polls of said election will open at
7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until
5 o'clock p. m. of said day of election,
dated this 23rd day of February, 1917.

Registration Notice

Notice is hereby given to the qualified
electors of the Village of Farmington,
County of Oakland, State of Michigan,
that a meeting of the Board of Registration
will be held at Firemen's Hall (water
works building) within said village, on

Saturday, March 10, A. D. 1917
for the purpose of registering the names
of all such persons who shall be possessed
of the necessary qualifications of electors
and who may apply for that purpose.

Women Electors.

In accordance with Section 4 of Article
3 of the Constitution of the State of Michi-
gan, and Act 206, Public Acts of 1909,
the Board of Registration of said village
will register the names of all women pos-
sessing the qualifications of male electors
who make personal application for such
registration; PROVIDED, that all such
applicants must own property assessed
for taxes within said village, except that
any woman otherwise qualified who owns
property within said village jointly with
her husband or other person, or who
owns property within said village un-
contract and pays taxes thereon, shall be
entitled to registration.

Following are the qualifications of male
electors in the State of Michigan:

Every male inhabitant of this state, be-
ing a citizen of the United States; every
male inhabitant residing in this state on
the 24th day of June, 1835; every male
inhabitant residing in this state on the
first day of January, 1850; every male in-
habitant of foreign birth, who, having re-
sided in the state two years and six
months prior to the Eighth day of No-
vember, 1904, and having declared his
intention to become a citizen of the
United States two years and six months
prior to the last named day, and every
civilized male inhabitant of Indian de-
scendant, native of the United States and not
a member of any tribe, shall be an elector
and entitled to vote; but no one shall be
an elector or entitled to vote at any elec-
tion unless he shall be above the age of
21 years, and has resided in this state six
months and in township or ward in
which he offers to vote 20 days next pre-
ceding such election.

Said Board of Registration will be in
session on the day and place aforesaid
from 8 to 12 in the forenoon and from 1
to 5 in the afternoon for the purpose
aforesaid.
