INTERESTING COURT DOINGS

Court Items of General Interest Obtained From the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.

Norman Forbes, of Royal Oak, was sentenced to serve 65 days in the Detroit house of correction for passing a 20 peso Mexican bill on his former landlady. The bill, which resembles a \$20 bill of American money, was absolutely worthless.

The case of People vs. Oscar Dickman, of Orion, charged with a serious offense against a young girl, has been dismissed by the Prosecuting Attorney through inability of the officers to obtain sufficient evidence to justify a trial in the circuit court.

Monday was a bad day for Local option violators in the circuit court. John Running, of Clarkston, and Abe Ritter, of Pontiac, were each sentenced to spend 90 days in the Detroit house of Correction, without the option of paying a fine. Both parties pleaded guilty to selling liquor in violation of the local option law.

Deputies from the sheriff's office raided the pool room of R. E. Norton at Royal Oak Saturday night, and as a result of the evidence obtained, Norton pleaded guilty to a charge of keeping a gaming table before Justice Ross Stockwell and was sentenced to spend 10 days in the County jail, paying a fine of \$50.00 and costs amounting to \$29.70. As a result of other evidence obtained, it is probable that another warrant will be authorized by the Prosecuting Attorney.

The criminal cases placed on the calendar for the March term of the circuit court are as follows: Henry Eschenberg, grand larceny; Alonzo E. Jones, malicious destruction of property; John Running, violation of the local option law; F. O. St. Dennis, embezzlement; John Rivers, grand larceny; William Saunders, forgery; Victor Lobere, exhibiting obscene pictures; Arthur Bailey, desertion; Harry B. Wales, violation of the city gas ordinance and Abe Allen, violation of city junk license ordinance.

Most Sensational Cow in World

The purebred Holstein-Friesian cow, Segis Fayne Johanna 114658, realized the long-cherished hopes of enthusiasts and electrified the dairy world when, under an official seven-day test ending January 8, she established a new world's record for butterfat production, producing in seven consecutive days 730.8 pounds of milk containing 50.68 pounds of butter. This remarkable animal has scored a brilliant triumph for the Black-and-White breed.

On December 28, 1916, this cow produced 97.9 pounds of milk; 2.667 pounds of butterfat, and 7.083 pounds of butter, which rate was increased to 801.3 pounds of milk on the 29th, with a daily average increase until January 8, 1917, when she produced 103.2 pounds of milk; 5.737 pounds of butterfat and 7.171 pounds of butter.

A bill has been introduced in the state legislature providing compensation for village officials—\$50 a year in villages under 1,000 population and \$60 a year for villages of more than 1,000. The tendency of such a law would be for the benefit of every village, in creating more interest in village affairs.

This is going to be a good year to grow large crops of every description, for with the international complications, the prices are bound to be strong. Even with peace declared, the European nations are going to need large food supplies for temporary relief, so there should be few idle acres on American farms.
