The Harrisons continued to British Columbia and Banff. Then the McLeennans went to San Francisco, took a cable car and ate at the famous Fisherman's Wharf.

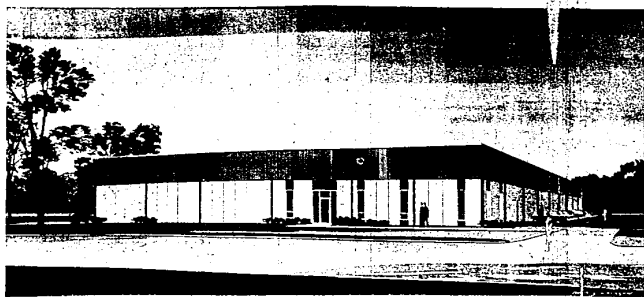

Saboteurs Surrender To Local Soldier

Robert Groff of Farmington, an MP on a river patrol boat in Long Binh, Vietnam, recently helped stop a saboteur from exploding the De Long Pier.

Groff spotted a swimmer in the water near the pier on a regular patrol mission. "He dove under the water so we threw concussion grenades at him to push him to get on the surface again," Groff explains.

While another MP guided the boat over to the swimmer, Groff pulled him out. "I wasn't going to take any chances with this guy," Groff said. "I couldn't see his other hand, but he knew he was going to get on the boat one way or another."

"He was smart under the circumstances. He got on the boat."

The suspect was turned over to an MP unit on shore.

Later the same night the MP's found another man swimming between two boats tied up at the pier. They fired shots and threw concussion grenades at him. He surrendered and Groff

again pulled him out.

A search of the area revealed two explosive devices, enough to put a good sized hole in the pier.

OCC To Spend \$280,000 For Faculty Pay Hike

Oakland Community College Board of Trustees has approved a 1969-70 faculty contract that calls for \$280,000 increase in faculty salaries.

The contract was ratified a week ago by the OCC Faculty Association. It is based on a 10-month schedule.

Beginning salaries for instructors will be \$9,300, maximum \$12,462. Last year's base pay was \$8,500 with a maximum of \$11,391.

Assistant professors will receive \$10,750 base, \$15,126 maximum, up from 1968's \$10,000 base, \$13,401 maximum.

Salary for associate professors will be \$12,200 base, \$17,165 maximum. Full professors will receive \$14,150 base, \$19,911 maximum.

The contract calls for a normal faculty teaching load of 12 credit hours of instruction, four credit hours in professional activities. The 16 credit hours of responsibility is down from last year's total of 20 hours.

Probationary period for new faculty members was reduced from three to two years.

The contract grievance procedure allows for binding arbitration of grievances as the final step of the bargaining procedure.

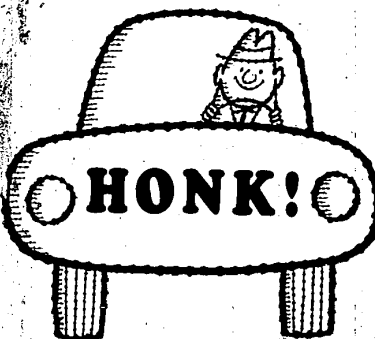
