Schools-OCC Combine For Sessions In Arts

A Summer Arts Workshop will be held June 24-Aug. 5 at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus on I-696 between Farmington and Orchard Lake Rds., Farmington Township.

Sponsored by OCC and the Farmington Public Schools, the six-week summer session in the arts will be offered for secondary school age students.

All rooms where workshops will be held are fully air-conditioned, according to Roland J. Sharfette, OCC Director of Cultural Affairs.

A COURSE IN DRAWING will be held 9-10 a.m. Monday through Friday in L-301. The course will be taught by Marcia Dettler who has a degree in art education from Ohio State University and is experienced in both studio and art history. Tuition is \$24 plus materials fee of \$6.

Students will learn the use of various drawing techniques including contour, line, shadow, mass impressions and expressive line quality. They will identify and analyze the structure of form and will render a variety of drawings on the basis of these observations.

Painting will be offered 10 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday in L-302 and will also be taught by Mrs. Dettler with the identical tuition and materials fee.

Students will learn painting techniques via a systematic approach to the philosophy behind brush and canvas. Gallery participation and discussion will supplement reading lists. In the studio, emphasis will be placed upon materials and concepts while encouraging personal and

SCULPTURE will be offered 10 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday in L-103. The instructor will be Judith Fraser, art instructor at North Farmington High School. Tuition is \$24 plus materials fee of \$6.

Students will learn basic techniques in composition and form for three-dimensional art expressions. Using basic casting, molding and chisel methods, they will have the opportunity to produce their own sculptures while learning to appreciate the philosophy of three-dimensional art.

Ceramics will be offered 9 a.m. to noon, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday in L-119 and will be taught by Donna Garrod, art instructor at East Junior High School. Tuition and fees are also \$30.

Students will gain skills in the fundamentals of hand-building techniques and the use of the potter's wheel. In addition, technical information concerning formation, mixing and application of glazes will be utilized to produce finished ceramic products for the students' knowledge and satisfaction.

PHOTOGRAPHY will be offered 8-10 a.m., Monday and Wednesday in D-107. Taught by Milo Hawley, chief photographer for OCC and former director of photography for local and west coast television stations, the course tuition is \$12 plus \$8 materials fee.

Students will learn all facets of photography from the taking of the picture to developing, printing and enlarging. Instructional efforts will be concentrated in composition of original exposures and creation of final display-ready prints. Special techniques in exposure, printing and matting will be explained. Students must provide their own good quality camera and film supply.

THEATER will be offered 10 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday in J-180. The course will be taught by William Johnston, an instrumental music teacher in the Farmington Public Schools who has a degree in theatre from Kalamazoo Col-

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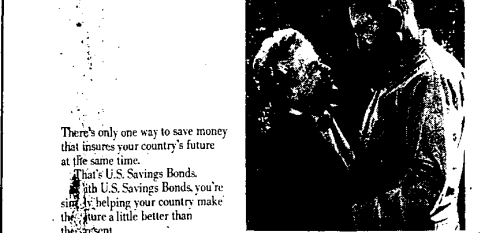


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Librarians To March In Streets?

Librarians say they're willing to sacrifice their image as quiet bespectacled matrons if they can get more federal aid for rapidly deteriorating facilities.

Mary Allison, trustee on the Farmington library board, says librarians may march on Washington to get their demands.

She is particularly concerned since building of a new library is being delayed here for lack of federal money.

But it seems only if stressers are made in huge quantities, like a march and press conference, do the legislators appear to listen," she notes.

She asks citizens to contact their legislators if they're concerned with the library crisis. Mrs. Allison favors sending Farmington delegates to the Washington march if librarians do decide to demonstrate.

Over 5,000 youngsters are expected to participate in summer recreational programs for disadvantaged youth now under way in Oakland County by the Oakland County Commission on Economic Opportunity (OCCOE).

INCLUDED IS A Neighborhood Youth Corps with 400 part-time jobs for youth from low income families.

Over \$100,000 in wages will be paid to enrollees during the 10-week summer program. Operating in all parts of the county youth will receive work-experience and on-the-job training, as well as remedial instruction. They are working as teachers, aides in Head Start classrooms, in Title I education programs and Upward Bound programs, as dietary aides in hospitals, in clerical work in OEO unit offices.

Summer employment and recreation programs for youth have started in 13 Oakland County communities, including Farmington.

OCCOE administered funds are contracted out to local community organizations, who conduct local area programs. Programs vary from community to community, depending on area needs and available resources.

The Oakland branch of the YMCA will also be conducting an OCCOE-financed day camp program, providing three two-week sessions for 30 children each. There will be one session for boys and girls ages five to seven, and two sessions for girls eight to 12 years of age.

PROJECT OUTREACH, conducted under an OCCOE contract with the West Oakland YMCA, provides an eight-week preventative services program for hard-to-reach and economically deprived youth in the Novi-Walled Lake area.

These are late afternoon, evening and weekend programs. Recreational activities include swimming, athletics and drop-

in center. There will also be individual and group counseling, tours and weekend camp trips for cultural enrichment, vocational training and placement.

The total OEO funds involved in the 14 contracts with local organizations is \$50,000.

Two new features have been added to programs this year. One is the organization of youth into committees which will help plan and conduct activities of the SCOPE, Outreach, Urban League and Individualized instruction programs.

The second new feature is the creation of a youth activities fund, made of funds remaining at the end of the programs which will be used to develop continuing activities, leading to year-round programs.

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
