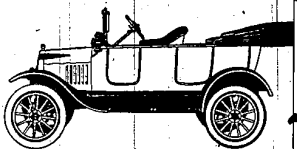

### PONTIAC COURT DOINGS

Court Items of General Interest Obtained From the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.

As a result of the campaign against speeders, over \$6000 was turned into the County treasury last week. There have been over 70 arrests so far this summer growing out of violations of the motor vehicle law.

Mattie Moore and Irene Lewis pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a disorderly house, and were given 90 and 65 days respectively in the Detroit house of correction, without a fine, by Justice Stockwell.

Sheriff Green and Prosecutor Gillespie, with several deputies, raided a residence on the nine mile road one night last week. Two of the inmates of the house were cited into court to answer to a charge of disorderly conduct.

Charles Booths was tried and convicted last week in the circuit court, charged with felonious assault. The case of People vs. Clarence Bailey was also tried before a jury. Bailey was sentenced Monday by Judge Smith to serve from one to ten years in Jackson prison for obtaining money by false pretenses. He secured about \$400 through worthless checks, drawn on the Birmingham savings bank.

The following cases have been placed upon the criminal calendar for the June term of court by Prosecutor Gillespie: William J. Murray, extortion; Roy Robertson, appeal; Charles E. Conneker, appeal; Walter J. Runyan, rape; F. O. St. Dennis, embezzlement; Charles Pollen, appeal; L. F. Squires, removing contract property; Elmer Gulick, arson and J. S. Gould, bigamy. Arraignments will be had in the circuit court Monday, June 4th, at which time several other cases will be added to the list for trial.

### NOTICE OF Military Registration

To Be Held  
Tuesday, June 5, 1917  
Age 21 to 30 Inclusive

By an act of Congress and a proclamation by the President of the United States, ALL MALE PERSONS who shall have attained their 21st birthday and who shall not have attained their 31st birthday on June 5th, 1917, must and are hereby commanded to appear for registration on Tuesday, the 5th day of June, 1917. Persons in the Military or Naval Service of the United States will be regarded as having been registered.

All Civil Officers of the State and Nation must be registered. This includes all persons engaged in making the present registration.

Penalty for Failure to Register  
Any person who shall willfully fail or refuse to present himself for registration or to submit thereto shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction in the district court of the United States having jurisdiction thereof, be punished by imprisonment for not more than one year and shall thereupon be duly registered.
