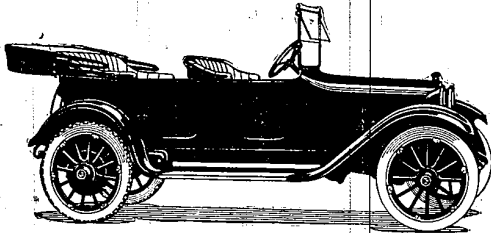

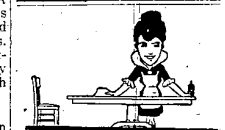
ORDER APPOINTING TIME FOR HEARING CLAIMS.
