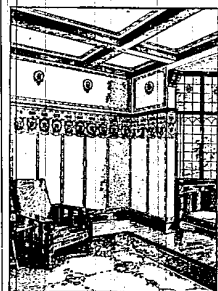

BOOST YOUR TOWN

About the most contemptible character who enjoys the many privileges of living in a small town is the fellow who pokes fun at it when talking to people from larger places. Do not neglect the child if he seems stupid. That is the time he needs attention. Any child who is weak or does not learn readily should be taken to a competent physician who can often find defects, the correction of which will make the child strong and robust both mentally and physically.

The 1909 legislature made it a crime to throw glass or other objects of injury to "pneumatic tires" in any highway. Perhaps those who indulge in this practice are not aware of the liability they are imposing upon themselves when they deliberately smash a bottle in the road, and the following is for their information: Section II, chapter 21 of act 283 passed in 1909, in substance reads that it is unlawful for any person willfully to place upon any path or sidewalk appurtenant thereto any glass, metal, stone or other substance which will be dangerous to pedestrians, animals or vehicles. The act states definitely that nothing shall be placed on the road which may injure or destroy pneumatic tires. The penalty for such a crime is a fine not less than \$1 and not exceeding \$10; with an addition of costs, or ten days in the county jail.
