SANATORIUM FOR OAKLAND In at least three sections of he state agitation is in progress or is just beginning for the erec tion of tuberculosis sanatoriums as county institutions. In the upper peninsula agitation has been on for some time for a joint institution to be built by Delta. Dickenson and Menominee coun ties; in Genesee county signatures have been secured to a petition to the board of supervisors to erect a \$100,000 building in Atlas township; and the latest move ment, yet in its early infancy, is in Oakland county.

Reports of the movement in this county have reached the Michigan Anti-tuberculosis association and that organization will try to help it along. While the county, it is believed that several of the adjoining counties may fall in with the plan, and that it may result in a joint institution. Attempts are being made to in-terest Livingston, Macomb, St Clair, Lapeer and Washtenaw counties.

The association of Charity and

the Anti-tuberculosis society of Pontiac recently employed a visiting nurse for Pontiac,, Miss Maude Toynton, and she is working for the movement of the establishmunt of a county sanatorium, declaring that it is much needed here.

On and after November 1st you will have to pay two cents to send a postal card through the mails and three cents for a letter (except a "drop" letter). Drop letters, those mailed for delivery at the office at which posted, re-quire a two cent stamp. Nearly every article of consumption or service rendered in the United States carries a war tax for the purchaser to pay. Unless great care is taken much trouble will be experienced by the postoffices, as thousonds of letters will be mailed without the required additional postage.

It is proposed at the next ses sion of congress to amend the draft bill to include all men be-tween the ages of 18 to 41, none to be called to service before they ach the age of 21 years. If the bill is so altered a new registra-tion will be ordered. This will give the government 12,000,000 extra men to call if necessary, it is estimated.
