The Second Liberty Loan

A Huge Success

As the nation is proud of its triumph, so in the same proportion can our little town point with pride to its showing. Farmington LED THE WAY in Oakland County, being the first township to complete its quota, and then over-subscribed \$31,000, finishing with a total of \$120,000.

Two per cent of this amount has been paid to the Treasurer of the Liberty Loan committee to this bank, which has in turn paid the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago a like amount.

ON JANUARY 15, 1918

the Federal Reserve Bank will have had received from us the full amount, \$120,000, in payments on the government plan as follows, f. e.:

18% November 15, 1917—\$21,000. 40% December 15, 1917—\$48,000. 40% January 15, 1918—\$48,000.

The community will realize that this is a very large amount and we urge your co-operation by making your payments promptly. Everybody who can do so is urged to put on the government plan, or in full on November 15th, if possible. This will help us in financing the loan.
