Sign and Display Lighting

An order of the United States Fuel Administration, effective November 15th, forbids the lighting of electric signs

Before 7:45 p. m., or After 11 p. m., Excepting

that each business place or theater may light a plain sign over its entrance, showing the name of the firm or the name of the business or the name of the theater and the show, and keep it lighted until the regular closing time of the store, or until half an hour after the show begins.

NOTICE

No signs may be lighted on any, excuse whatever until half an hour after sunset, which is street lighting time; nor after eleven o'clock at night. There is no limitation of lighting between 7:45 and 11 p. m., but we expect that later there will be limitation of excessive display.

The State Fuel Administrator is authorized to enforce this order. We invite all good citizens to conform to it at once.
