Notice of Special School Meeting
By virtue of the order and direction of the District Board of School District Number Five, of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, notice is hereby given that a special meeting of said School District will be held at the School House in Farmington, in said District on the 18th day of February 1918, at six o'clock P. M. Central Standard Time, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District the proposition to borrow the sum of \$32,000 and to issue the bonds therefore, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 4 3/4% per annum payable semi-annually. Said bonds to be of the denomination of \$1,000 each and to mature as follows: \$1,000 on March 1st, of each year from 1921 to 1929 inclusive, and \$2,000 on March 1st of each year, from 1930 to 1932 inclusive, and \$17,000 on March 1, 1933. Said bonds to be used to defray the expense of building a new School Building in the Village of Farmington in said District. The polls for said election are to be open for two consecutive hours. Notice is hereby given that the District Board of said District has estimated the amount necessary to defray the expense of bringing to completion said new School Building to be the sum of \$35,000.
