SALE OF SCHOOL BONDS

The bonds that were authorized under the following resolution, adopted by the legal voters of School District No. 5, Farmington, by vote of 87 for to 32 against, will be offered for sale at a meeting of Board at school house on Tuesday evening, February 26, 1918, at 8 p. m. eastern time. Resolution as passed:

"Be it Resolved, that this School District borrow Thirty-two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000), to erect a new school building in the Village of Farmington, and that the District Board be and it is authorized and instructed to borrow the same and issue bonds of the district therefor, said bonds to be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, and to mature as follows: \$1,000 on March 1st of each year, from 1921 to 1929 inclusive, and \$2,000 on March 1st of each year, from 1930 to 1932, and \$17,000 on March 1st, 1933, and to bear interest at the rate not to exceed four and three-fourths per centum (4 3/4) per annum, payable semi-annually."

Assessed valuation of District \$1,020,898.00. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

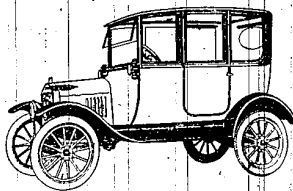

Registration Notice

Important Change in Registration Laws

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF FARMINGTON, STATE OF MICHIGAN: Notice is hereby given that in conformity with Act 121, Public Acts of 1917, the undersigned village clerk, will upon any evening Monday and a legal holiday of the day of any regular or special election receive for registration the name of any qualified voter in that village not already registered who may APPLY TO ME PERSONALLY for such registration, except that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the second Saturday before any general or special election and the day of said election.

March 2, 1918—Last Day for General Registration for Election March 11

All electors not already registered and intending to vote at said ELECTION, should make PERSONAL APPLICATION to me on or before the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1918.

Notice is further hereby given that I, will be at

where I will REVIEW THE REGISTRATION and REGISTER qualified electors who may apply therefor.

Feb. 16, and Feb. 23, 1918

From 8 o'clock a. m. until 5 o'clock p. m. on each said day for the purpose of RECEIVING REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said village as SHALL APPEAR and apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, to remain and reside to vote at the next election shall be entered in the registration book.

Registration of Absentee by Oath

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall, UNDER OATH, state that he is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the village TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or some member of his family or owing to his absence from the village on public business or his own business and in order to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and, upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct

Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED from ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a village to another election precinct of the same village shall have the right, on any day previous to election day, on application to the Village Clerk, to have his name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he has removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he then resides. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on ELECTION DAY by obtaining from the board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he HAS REMOVED a CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE THEN RESIDES.

Women Electors

The names of all qualified WOMEN ELECTORS not already appearing on the registration book will be registered, provided PERSONAL APPLICATION is made in conformity with the foregoing provisions.
