Use Fig Dull Tester.

The Trag dell' seed tester, a simple and reliable inethod of determining germination, will tell you whether your seed corn is fit to plant. This method of testing com is described in detail in Farmers Bulletin 184 of the department of lagriculture. Belefy it consists of a trip of cloth, preferably blenched muslin, 10 inches wide and from 3 to 5 feet long. The cloth should be marked off into squared sections and the squares all numbered. The ears to be tested should also be given corresponding numbers, 1812 or more kernels should be sadered in the proper section. When the user is filled, fold over each site, so that the edges meet in the center, roll up and soak the tester for a few hours in luckyarm water. Drain the excess water off, and place the dolls in a warm place to germinate. They should be sufficiently well germinated to show their fitness for seed.
