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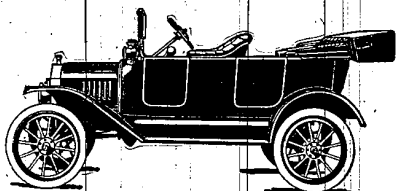

**COME AGAIN**

In our opinion the address at the Methodist church last Sunday evening was fraught with more good than all the erstwhile campaigning for the conservation of food stuffs.

The address was not an oratorical masterpiece, but just a plain heart to heart talk of one who "has been there" and suffered the pangs of hunger and the ravages of tropical disease.

Sargeant Major Milbank, of the Canadian stationary hospital unit stationed at the entrance of the Dardinals, made a lasting impression on the large audience as to the necessity of keeping our boys at the front well provisioned.

As we were passing out of the church frequent remarks were heard in the following strain: "Well, I guess we won't complain any more of the flour we get," "that talk was right to the point, and has taught me, for one lesson," "we ought to be willing to put up with what we get and be contented, after hearing that talk," etc.

Major Milbank expressed the opinion that it was useless for Uncle Sam to send the boys overseas unless they were accompanied by Red Cross workers, thoroughly supported by the people back home—that the Red Cross was doing as much toward winning the war as the boys on the firing line.

Being asked what part the churches were talking in war work he stated that the church was the Red Cross and the Red Cross was the church.

More such talks by men with actual experience would do more to "awaken the American people" than any effort yet put forth.

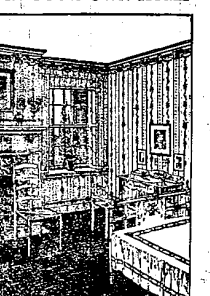
