Webster; also the clerk.The following report of the annual
village election, held March 14th, was
read, and on motion the same was
confirmed.The whole number of votes cast was
56, of which George Francis for president
received 36; W. E. Lord, for clerk, 55;
J. J. Eisenlord, for treasurer, 55; R. G.
Hogle, for trustee, 55; Arthur Lamb, for
trustee, 55; F. H. Nichols, for trustee 53;
J. E. Thayer, for assessor, 50.

On motion the council adjourned.

Light—Nichols, Webster and Lamb.Health Officer—Dr. J. A. Miller.
Member Cemetery Committee—M. B.

Dickerson and F. M. Warner.Moved and seconded that George
Francis be reappointed marshal. Car-
ried.Moved by Trustee Nichols and sup-
ported by Trustee Walters that clerk's
salary for the coming year be \$104.
Carried.Moved by Trustee Nichols and sup-
ported by Trustee Walters that treasurer's
salary be 1% of collection of tax roll.
Carried.Moved by Trustee Nichols and sup-
ported by Trustee Ely that health officer's
salary be same as last year, \$10.00. Car-
ried.The treasurer's bond of N. J. Eisenlord
was accepted, the ballot being as follows:
Ayes, Trustees Lamb, Ely, Nichols, Wal-
ters; Nays none, Trustee Webster de-
clining to vote.The committee appointed to investi-
gate the purchase of the Melancton prop-
erty reported that the price was \$600,
which in their opinion was too high.The committee on the refund of money
due from township reported that the
matter was held up pending an opinion
from the prosecuting attorney.

President Francis appointed Trustees
Ely, Nichols and Lamb as a committee
to draw up a petition in regard to
width of paving through village and circulate
for signatures of property owners from
Crosby's corner, west to the point east
of the cemetery.Moved by Trustee Ely and supported
by Trustee Nichols that clerk be allowed
full year's salary for past year. Carried.A resolution was adopted granting the
trustee a salary of \$5.00 for each meet-
ing attended.Vote as follows: Ayes, Lamb, Hogle,
Webster, Ely, Nichols and Walters.
Nays, none.Moved and seconded that salary of
election board be \$3.00 each. Carried.The clerk reported that he had received
up to April 1st, as revenues from the vil-
lage scales \$11.60.On motion the following bills were
ordered paid:
Farmington Enterprise, printing
and publishing, \$24.64
W. E. Lord salary as clerk, 60.00
Ford Sales Service, supplies, 3.20
Martin & Jamison, blacksmithing, 2.25
No further business appearing the
council adjourned.
