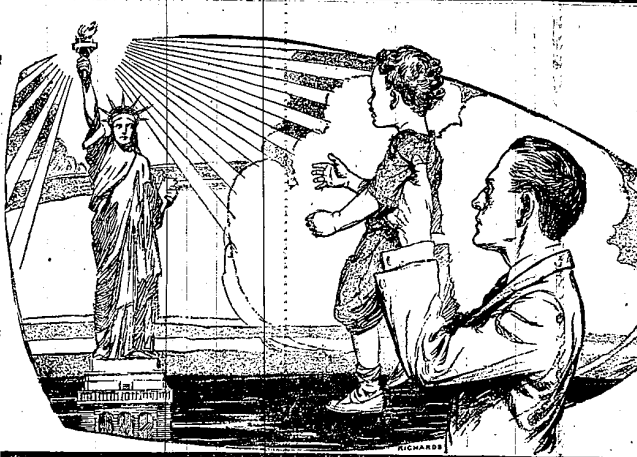
Mrs. Leon Green, Miss Alice Priestley, Lester Harger and Forest Green attended the Novi entertainment last Friday evening and report a fine time.
